OVERVIEW OF OPEN GOVERNMENT RESPONSIBILITIES OF BOARD MEMBERS

Education Division Attorney General's Office

Open Government Trainings Act

- Every member of the governing body of a public agency must complete OPM training within 90 days of assuming duties or taking oath of office. Thereafter, training required every four years.
- --RCW 42.30.205.

OPEN PUBLIC MEETINGS ACT Legislative Declaration of Purpose – RCW 42.30.010

- Public agencies of this state exist to aid in the conduct of the people's business. Actions are to be taken openly and deliberations conducted openly. They must remain informed so they may retain control over the instruments they have created.
- The people do not yield their sovereignty to the agencies which serve them.
- The people do not give public servants the right to decide what is good for the people to know and what is not good for them to know.

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OPEN PUBLIC MEETINGS ACT (RCW 42.30)

- All meetings of the governing body of a public agency shall be open and public (RCW 42.30.030).
- Each board of trustees shall follow procedures for open public meetings. Each board shall provide time for public comment. (RCW 28B.50.100).
- Minutes must be recorded and are open to public inspection (RCW 42.32.030).

What is a Governing Body?

"All meetings of a *governing body* of a public agency shall be open and public . . . "

- Multi-member governing bodies of state and local agencies.
- Subcommittees, if quorum of board.
- Subcommittee, if delegated final decisionmaking authority, conducting hearings, or taking public testimony.
- Governing Body of Associated Students.

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What Constitutes a Meeting?

"All *meetings* of a governing body of a public agency shall be open and public . . . "

- A meeting is a gathering where "action" is taken. Any such meeting must be open.
- "Action" means "the transaction of the official business of a public agency by a governing body including but not limited to:

"ACTION"

- Public testimony
- All deliberations
- Discussions
- Reviews
- Evaluations
- Final action (collective positive or negative decision or final vote by a majority sitting as a body or entity)

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Travel & Gathering

"It shall not be a violation of the requirements of this chapter for a majority of the members of a governing body to travel together or gather for the purposes other than a regular meeting or special meeting...PROVIDED, That they take no action as defined by this chapter." RCW 42.30.070

GIVING NOTICE: REGULAR MEETINGS

- Recurring meetings of the public body.
- Colleges must adopt regular scheduled meetings by rule in the Washington Administrative Code (WAC).
 All state agencies, including colleges, file yearly prior to January 1st with Code Reviser.
- No agenda requirement.
- 20 day notice to change date of regular meeting

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GIVING NOTICE: SPECIAL MEETINGS

- Final action limited to agenda items
- Written notice must be given to:
 - Each member of governing body
 - Each media entity which has requested notice
 - Posted on College website
- Delivered at least 24 hours in advance
- Must specify:
 - Time
 - Place
 - Business to be transacted (agenda).

EXECUTIVE SESSIONS

Are authorized for limited, specific topics listed, including:

- Receive and evaluate complaints or charges against a public officer or employee
- Review performance of a public employee
- Evaluate qualifications of a job applicant
- Meet with legal counsel concerning reasonably anticipated litigation and legal risks
- Consider site selection, acquisition, or sale price of real estate*
- Quasi-judicial actions (exempt)
- Collective bargaining strategy (exempt)

RCW 42.30.110; 140

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Action to Hire

- "[W]hen a governing body elects to take final action hiring, setting the salary of an individual employee or class of employees, or discharging or disciplining an employee, that action shall be taken in a meeting open to the public;"
- RCW 42.30.110(g).

Public Attendance

- A public agency can't place conditions on public to attend meeting subject to OPMA:
 - For proceedings governed by OPMA, cannot require people to register their names or other information, complete a questionnaire, or otherwise fulfill any condition precedent to attendance
 - ~ RCW 42.30.040
- Reasonable rules of conduct can be set. Can remove disruptive individuals. If meeting is disrupted can clear room or adjourn to another place and reconvene.
- Cameras and tape recorders are permitted unless disruptive
 AGO 1998 No. 15

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Going into Executive Session

• "... [T]he presiding officer of a governing body shall publicly announce the purpose for excluding the public from the meeting and the time when the executive session will be concluded." (RCW 42.30.110(2))

Penalties for Violating Open Public Meetings Act

- Personal civil liability (\$500/\$1000 penalty)
- Costs and attorneys fees
- Action taken is null and void
- Media attention (of the unfavorable kind)

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Emails / Texts

• An exchange of emails among board members can constitute a deliberation or discussion, i.e., "action", and thus, a "meeting" subject to the Open Public Meetings Act.

Wood v. Battle Ground School District (2001).

To: Smith From: Jones

After we spoke yesterday, I texted Trustee Doe to give her the gist of the issue. She concurred that we should be united on this.

Any problems presented by this email? Has there been a meeting?

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PUBLIC RECORDS -- RCW 42.56

- Any writing containing information relating to (a) the conduct of government, or (b) the performance of any governmental or proprietary function
- Prepared, owned, used, or retained by any agency
- Writing can be in any media or format

Public records definition (cont'd)

- The definition is broad enough to encompass anything prepared for College business or use.
- Includes emails and any other materials you prepare on personal computer, smartphone, tablet, and voice mail to communicate about college business.

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Public Policy Strongly Favors Disclosure

- The duty to disclose public records is broadly construed. Public policy favors disclosure
- Exemptions are narrowly construed
- Public has right to inspect and seek copies, unless a specific exemption applies.
- College must designate a public records officer, who must receive training.

Some Exemptions RCW 42.56.230-480

- Student Education Records under federal law (the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20 U.S.C. Sec. 1232g)
- Communications protected by the attorney-client privilege
- Private information in employee personnel files/application materials
- Test questions, scoring keys, and other examination data used to administer an academic exam
- Trade secrets
- Preliminary drafts in which policies are formulated

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PUBLIC RECORDS

- Penalties can range from \$0-\$100 per day per record for improperly withheld records.
- Tip: Compose everything you put in writing even tangentially related to college business as if it will be made public at some point.
- Tip II: Do not use the "Reply All" function on your email.
- Tip III: To extent possible, use College-owned devices. If not possible, keep all college-related emails in one easily identifiable folder.

Document Retention

- Documents created or received by Trustees regarding College business are public records
- No public record can legally be destroyed without authorization
- Records retention schedules tell you how long records must be kept
- Transitory records are temporary in nature and are not needed for any official purpose and have no retention value. Examples:
 - Scheduling
 - Greetings
 - Notices
 - Transmittal letters
 - Duplicate copies (but don't assume someone else has kept a copy)
 - Preliminary drafts

President's Report

Student Success Story

Avriana Johnson is in the Human Services Program. She chose CPTC not only for the excellent academic courses but also for the hands-on training. Ms. Johnson said it has been a life-changing experience in her personal life, values, perspective, and even how she carries herself. Through having a baby during finals and working part-time as a work-study in Financial Aid, she has maintained high academic standards. Her future plans are to enroll in the Bachelors Program for Human Services at Evergreen State College.

PCCC Meeting

The Pierce County Coordinating Council met on Thursday, December 7, for the annual Legislative Breakfast, led by this year's Chair, Trustee Lachney. The purpose is to increase awareness of the work of colleges in the county, share information regarding priorities, and provide an opportunity for legislators to share information with PCCC. Issues:

- The significant impact colleges have faced as a result of the legislature not passing a capital budget.
- The concept that salary increases in the K-12 system as a result of the McCleary decision has/will have the impact of creating disparity between K-12 and higher education.
- There were two student stories, one from TCC, and one from CPTC. Trustee Moss introduced CPTC's speaker, Heather Morgan, who is in the Human Services Program. Ms. Morgan's journey was bumpy, and with help from the Opportunity Grant, work study, and Worker Retraining, she has persevered with a 3.9 GPA.

Holiday House

Holiday House is an annual volunteer committee that has raised money to provide food, toys/gifts, or gift cards to qualified student families for 31 years. On distribution day, families can experience a memorable time when they visit Santa, have some refreshments, and, this year, an activity table was added. Holiday House continues because of the generosity of CPTC's programs, faculty, staff, students, and community contributions. Families assisted this year – 100, number of children who received gift cards – 204.

ACCT National Legislative Summit February 11-14, 2018, in Washington, D.C. President Loveday will accompany one Trustee to this annual meeting. Trustees were asked to let Ms. Steele know if they are interested in attending.

Annual Trustee Retreat, January 19, 2018, 8:15 a.m.-4:00 p.m., Building 23, Room 212
At the Annual Trustee Retreat, Trustees and the Executive Team will review results in the areas identified in 2016 as priorities – Enrollment, Retention/Completion, and Employment, and align future goals with strategic goals.

Miscellaneous

• On December 7, the faculty bargaining unit and College leadership signed the Faculty Collective Bargaining Agreement for CPTC. This agreement places value on developing teaching and learning for CPTC by adding in-service dates and creating an increment system that honors this professional development. It also lowers the number of teaching days for faculty members and rewards faculty serving in Program Chair positions.

- The Student Council attended the 2017 Legislative Academy, hosted by the Council of Unions and Student Programs, and focused on advocacy and legislative processes to prepare for the legislative session.
- CPTC's 75th Anniversary Gala will be held on Saturday, May 19. The goals are to raise \$75,000 for student emergency grants and to celebrate the history of our College.

College Reports or Highlights

ASG Report (Tab 2)

Alex Haley, Clubs Officer for Student Council, presented the attached report. She thanked President Loveday for being so supportive of ASG and other student events.

Guided Pathways (Tab 3)

VP Dotson and Mr. Kelly presented the attached update on Guided Pathways (GP). The grant application was due October 30, and the College was notified soon after that CPTC was invited to the second round, which was an interview process. CPTC was one of nine finalists, and a team of six people were interviewed on November 28. The SBCTC and College Spark has made a recommendation for funding of five colleges, and the vote will occur on January 13.

Trustee Moss commented there was discussion about GP at the PCCC meeting and asked if CPTC could benefit from Pierce College's experience. Ms. Dotson said yes, and the PIO's will invite some of the legislators interested in GP to talk more in-depth.

Trustee Lachney wanted assurance that with any curriculum redesign there will be discussion with credentialing bodies concerning Certificate Programs and Degrees. Ms. Dotson noted that curriculum design will have specific sections that build on the next section to get a student to an exit point.

Student Retention Initiatives (Tab 4)

VP Latiolais talked about the new 3-Year Retention Plan. Trustee Lachney is excited to see group registration and wonders if it will translate into retention. He encouraged VP Latiolais to bring forward data to identify those impediments and then relate how we can overcome those impediments. VP Latiolais thinks the metrics are key, measurements have to be in concert with the learning outcomes, and look at the data on a quarter-to-quarter basis. When impediments are narrowed down with some good data, Trustee Lachney would like programs created utilizing the software we have, so it becomes more of an ingrained culture between what the students see and what faculty see.

Trustee Moss attended the Foundation Board meeting and reported the Foundation had a good audit report. Also, the 75th Anniversary Gala is scheduled for May 19, 2018, and Trustee Moss challenged Trustees to attend.

Trustee Lachney attended the PCCC Annual Legislative Breakfast. He led a discussion on the effect the Hirst Decision has had on the state's Capital Budget. He thanked VP Clark and his team for providing budget information.




